HOPSCOTCH: THE VIRAL VIDEO

MHC's fitness committee is always looking for new ways to keep staff healthy. About five years ago, Workplaces in motion, a Manitoba Health initiative dedicated to healthy living, circulated a list of quick fitness ideas. "Draw a hopscotch outside your workplace" was one of the ideas.

We thought that would make a fun video, but it was so expensive at the time we decided against it. We kept the idea on file and this year, we decided to set up a GoPro to capture the experience. Nicole Perras, Recreation Facilitator and fitness committee member, was recruited to draw the hopscotch.

We met with the Mulvey school principal, Peter Correia, as a courtesy to let him know we'd be filming students on their way to school. He was so excited by the idea that he offered to send a class over to hop through!

The day before filming, we emailed a note to staff and posted on M-NET, encouraging staff to "hop their way to good health" outside our Wolseley entrance.

The videographer only filmed for an hour from 8-9 a.m. on Monday, June 27, so the people in the video are only a fraction of those who hopped through. Actually, passers-by continued to hop through until the rain washed away the hopscotch a few days later.

We posted the video on MHC's Facebook page and the rest is history. This is a wonderful example of the power of social media and "going viral." The popularity of the video, nearly 2,000 shares, over 102,200 views on Facebook and Youtube, meant media outlets contacted us to find out more. There was a story on the Winnipeg Free Press website and the video aired on CBC and CTV national.

Many people also sent us pictures of the hopscotches we inspired them to draw outside their workplaces and homes!

SCULPTOR HELEN NORMAN VISITS MHC

This sculpture contains images of Mother Rosalie Cadron-Jetté, our founder and Ignace Bourget, a Bishop of Montreal who directed Rosalie to develop crisis accommodation for unwed mothers and was inspired to establish the religious community of the Sisters of Misericordia.

Reflecting on these beautiful sculptures I was reminded that we are called to practice the corporal and spiritual works of mercy in service to those in need... just as the founder of the Misericordia Sisters, Mother Rosalie Cadron-Jetté taught us.



MEMO - CORNISH 5 RENOVATIONS

We are pleased to let you know that Misericordia Health Centre has a project underway to update the Respite Care Program and Interim Care Program environments. The Unit renovations will develop an additional accessible bathroom as well update to all unit rooms, dining rooms and common areas so we can continue to provide excellent care and meet the needs of our Respite and Interim care residents.

In order to accomplish this renovation work safely, it will be necessary for some current Cornish 5 residents to be relocated to new rooms within the Misericordia Interim Care Program. Individual residents and families who are affected by the first phase of this project have been contacted directly regarding this.

We apologize for the inconvenience of the renovations and construction, and appreciate your understanding and patience as we work on this upgrade project.

Cornish 5 unit census will remain reduced to 28 residents maximum during this renovation time. Managers are organizing and working together to ensure coordination and quality care continue. Assessment of needs of supply quotas, support services and locations of care may change during the renovation project. Please communicate directly with Martine McGinn as Resident Care Manager lead to work through any questions or issues.

Phase 1 - C5 East Wing begins September 5 and extends to Oct 10

Phase 2 - C5 West Wing begins October 10 and extends to November 18

Phase 3 - C5 North Wing and Supply area begins November 18 and extends to January 2

years he worked the family grain and livestock farm with his father and brother until the industry started going through rapid changes. The three men decided it was time to call it quits and Jon's dad retired while he and his brother moved on to new careers.

The move was made from working in agriculture to working in radio communications, talking about agriculture. Working for Golden West Radio and as a freelance writer he wrote and talked about agriculture and agribusiness for 10 years.

After a bad car accident, where he suffered neurological injuries, Jon went through physiotherapy as a part of his recovery. During this time he made the decision to become a physiotherapist, working with clients with neurological injuries.

Jon appears to have a passion for anything neurological as indicated by the books he can be found reading. These books set a sharp contrast to his choice of B movies where the campier the plot the better; listing Steven King's "Maximum Overdrive," "Dumb and Dumber" and Mel Brooks's "Space Balls" as some of his favourites.

Today his biggest accomplishment, and the best part of his day, is his two-year old daughter Denali. He described her as empathetic, helpful and self centred stating "she is the most fun person I have ever met" and "she screams a lot." According to Jon, Denali's favourite movie is "The Incredibles."

Tips for Safe Lifting

- Before you lift, ensure the area is clear and free of clutter.
- Get help for a heavy load!
- Use a cart when possible.
- Lift with as straight a back as is comfortable--a "rounded" back increases the risk of injury.
- Hold the load close to your body.
- Avoid twisting!
