## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: COFFEE WITH CAROLINE



"Coffee with Caroline" sessions provide an opportunity for me to meet informally with staff across MHC and receive valuable feedback. The sessions also give staff from across the facility a chance to meet colleagues outside of their department.

Here's how it works: Human Resources randomly selects staff and sends invitations in advance. We meet in corporate office – with coffee and cookies, of course – and have conversations about what staff really value about MHC and about where we can improve.

All comments are recorded, but kept anonymous! Notes taken of the valued areas and opportunities for

improvement are brought to the senior leadership team for sharing, awareness and review.

I'm really enjoying these sessions — from getting to know staff on a more personal level to hearing some great ideas for areas of improvement.

No idea is too small! At a recent session, a staff member let me know that not all our elevator buttons light up — which can lead to confusion as to whether or not the button has been pressed. This is a good point and hopefully something we can remedy.

At another session a staff member requested more park benches outside for staff and family. I'm happy to report we'll be installing new benches in the green space along Sherbrook Street this spring!

I have heard loud and clear we need a new food service! I agree entirely and can't wait to make an announcement. I wish things worked faster in negotiations with food vendors, but we have to follow a regional contracting process and it takes time. On the upside, the new food service will also bring significant updates to the cafeteria space.

It's heart-warming and affirming for me to have so many staff say how proud they are to work at MHC and touch on some strong themes about what makes Misericordia a wonderful place to work: feeling like a family and the value-add of our faith-based Mission top the list. And those are reasons that also drew me to Misericordia.

# MHC FOUNDATION: STAFF EDUCATION

At the end of January our Foundation was able to fund Jaime Barr's, Eye Bank Technician, travel to Philadelphia to attend a technical education seminar put on by the Eye Bank Association of America. The seminar helps prepare new technicians on the practical, technical and scientific aspects of the eye banking practice. It is designed to fit the needs of beginning eye bank technicians and is a beneficial component to prepare for the certification examination which allows technicians to be accredited to release tissues. Jaime found the entire course to be extremely beneficial to her everyday work here at MHC.

The Misericordia Eye Bank operates differently than other eye banks, primarily due to our size. At MHC eye bank technicians are involved in the entire process:

- taking the call when there is a potential donation
- screening to make sure the tissue meets the strict criteria
- contacting next of kin and obtaining consent for donation of the gift of sight
- performing the enucleation (removal of the eve tissue)
- bringing the tissue back to MHC to process
- and, after the tissue clears, taking the tissue to the surgeon for transplanting

Jaime appreciates how MHC operates as she gets hands-on experience with the entire process unlike in other larger eye banks, where technicians will just have one role such as screening or enucleation. Currently, MHC has only one technician that is able to release tissues. Once certified, Jaime will be able to do the entire process from start to finish and we will have two staff members to share the workload. Calls for tissue donations come in at any time, day or night.

I was born at Misericordia on a beautiful spring day in early April only to be brought home from hospital 10 days later in a blizzard. So Winnipeg!

As I thought about this story I realized how often my path has intersected with MHC. At the age of two I had my tonsils out and I've been told that I wasn't the most cooperative patient. The nurses kindly allowed me to take my doll into the OR and the surgical team performed all of the procedures on my doll first to reassure me. Even then Misericordia staff were caring and compassionate.

I remember waving to my father through his patient room's window from the sidewalk below when he was recovering from pneumonia (children weren't allowed to visit hospitals then) and my parents picking up

my aunt from her shift in the admitting department. I remember visiting my sister after surgery and her visiting me after I had some later surgery. I remember taking my children to Urgent Care late in the night and accompanying family members to the Sleep Disorder Centre for a study and the Eye Care Centre of Excellence for cataract surgery. I remember visiting my mother-in-law and my own mother in Interim Care where they both received excellent care. MHC has been there for me and my family throughout our lives.

I think I joined the MHC Board of Directors to give back to this institution in some small way and to try to ensure its continued presence in the community. During my first year on the MHC Board of Directors I have been fortunate to work on the Quality, Patient Safety & Risk Management Committee and the Mission & Catholic Identity Committee.

My health-care career started in nursing and during school MHC was my first exposure to labour and delivery. Following graduation I worked as a nurse in Churchill for a time and when I became a physician I started attending at Concordia and St. Boniface Hospitals.

Following the birth of my first child I worked part-time at Student Health at the University of Manitoba and then as a preceptor at St. Boniface Hospital at the Family Medical Centre. I also attended for several years at Riverview Health Centre, briefly in palliative care and later on one of the cognitive care units. Then I finally settled at Tuxedo Family Medical Centre where I spent most of my career. In late 2015 I attempted retirement but couldn't stay home so am now filling in at Linden Ridge Medical Centre as I ease back into retirement gradually.

My "volunteer" activities (I put volunteer in quotations since Father Darrin considers this work to be a moral responsibility) centre primarily on my parish of St. Gianna's where I bring communion to the sick, serve communion at mass and act as a member of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) team. I am also currently in my second year of the Nathanael Experience. As I continue to ease into retirement and no longer have the care of elderly and ill family members to occupy me I am looking forward to further volunteer opportunities and the potential to travel in the future.

This June, I look forward to volunteering at the 2019 Staff Appreciation Barbecue and to seeing you all there.



This year's partner for the Festival of Bread is Hildegard's Bakery, located on the corner of Portage and Maryland.






Jenifer Downie, Occupational Health Nurse
