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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: MIIC OPENING



Our new Minor Injury and Illness Clinic (MIIC) is up and running! We've experienced some initial adjustments, which was to be expected, and are pleased with the efficiency of the clinic. Seeing the high volumes highlights this type of care really was needed in our community.

Minor Injury and Illness Clinics provide quick, convenient and high-quality care for minor health injuries and illnesses. MHC MIIC patients are benefitting from synergies with our existing programs and

services such as casting, ophthalmology, diagnostic imaging and lab services.

A reminder our MIIC is open seven days a week with varying hours as we build for capacity. The clinic will be open daily 7:30 a.m. – 10 p.m. when it is in full operation in the coming months.

This is the first clinic in Misericordia's history that allows patients to book online! Patients are encouraged to book same-day and next-day appointments online as we have limited walk-in availability.

MED SLED TRAINING

As part of disaster management planning, MHC conducts regular drills, mock codes to ensure staff are ready and trained to effectively respond to different emergencies to keep patient safe.

This year we are excited to incorporate Med Sled as part of the Code Green – Vertical evacuation plan. Med Sled is a device that can be used to facilitate fast evacuation down stairwell to efficiently and safely transport non-ambulatory patients.



QUICK TIPS

Pens in Healthcare



Pens, common in healthcare settings, are a potential vector to spread infections. Recent studies* have shown high levels of bacteria were found on pens, and bacteria can then be transmitted via pens from one hand to another.

How do we decrease the risk of transmission from pens?

Consider staff pens' as part of the PATIENT ENVIRONMENT

Pens should stay in the patient environment, and not travel in and out of the patients' space. In doing so, staff can go back and forth between the patient and patient environment (i.e., their pen) without having to perform hand hygiene.

If pens are considered part of the EXTERNAL (HEALTHCARE) ENVIRONMENT and stored in staff pockets, hands must be cleaned before and after having contact with pen(s).

This means, if staff have contact with the patient and then need to chart something in the room, they would need to:

- clean their hands
- retrieve their pen
- use their pen
- put it back in their pocket
- clean their hands again and then they could have contact with the patient environment

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Decrease the number of hand hygiene opportunities required by making pens part of the patient environment.

 Consider ways to support this including supplying pens and pen holders for patient rooms, so staff don't have to access their own.
- 2 If pens continue to be carried in staff pockets, it is important to be mindful of the required sequence of events and moments for hand hygiene.
