Happy spring!

I'm excited to share beginning May 1 our annual eye surgery volumes will increase by 2,500 surgeries – that's more than 11,500 total surgeries over the course of a year.


This is the largest increase in surgery volumes in Misericordia's history.

We'll be adding an additional slate every day to our operating rooms. The new volumes include cataract surgeries and specialty eye surgeries such as glaucoma, retinal, corneal transplants and strabismus.

This is no small feat: we're busy hiring new nursing and support staff to be able to perform these increased volumes.

I know our ophthalmologists are equally excited to be able to offer more surgeries to meet our communities' needs. The surgery volumes increase will go a long way in addressing our surgical backlogs.

I see this as a pivotal step along the path of propelling our Eye Care Centre of Excellence into Canada's premier eye institute, the **first priority** in our 2022-2026 strategic plan.



Stay tuned for planning updates, including specialty ophthalmology components, about our new Sherbrook Development, the **second priority** in our 2022-2026 strategic plan!

And I should also mention the third priority: how we'll be performing these surgeries. Our **third priority** is to foster innovation and to drive excellence in all that we do. Our Eye Care Centre of Excellence community in particular is stellar at viewing all aspects of care with an innovation lens: from identifying service efficiencies to enhancing the patient experience and improving care.

I'm incredibly proud of our MHC teams for the tremendous amount of preparatory work and the ramping up effort required to make these new volumes a reality.

Why:


Research shows therapy dogs can assist in improving mental health and can help calm people in their workplace.

On March 31 we bid a grateful goodbye to our entry-point screeners who have been such an important part of our Misericordia Family throughout the pandemic.

As we move forward the same entrances will continue to operate with an entry-point security presence when possible and everyone entering MHC will still be required to clean their hands and wear a mask.

The entrance at the end of the overpass (by the donor wall) will revert to pre-COVID process of being locked nightly at 7 p.m. Anyone entering or exiting will need to press a button beside the doors. The parkade first-floor entry points will be locked at all times. Staff/MP frequent visitors can use access cards or the punch code to enter the first floor of the parkade building while others will need to use the intercom system. All staff are reminded to self-screen before coming to work.

AMBULATORY CARE PATIENTS LIKE FAMILY Whether it's the smiles from staff when you walk into the waiting

area or the personal cards from patients posted on the walls, it's easy to see why the Ambulatory Care team at MHC considers themselves a tight knit family.

"When I first worked here there were still nuns here, it was a long time ago," said RN Brad Black.

"This has always been my home."

Ambulatory Care clinics at MHC serve patients from all walks of life—in the city and those who travel from rural communities for

On Tuesdays and Thursdays, it offers diabetic foot clinics where patients are assessed for ulcers. Charcot foot fractures and other conditions that affect the foot related to diabetes. Orthopedic specialists are present in the clinic on Mondays and Wednesdays. Black says many people choose the Ambulatory Care clinics for the sense of community.

"We work together as a team, and most of our patients come in regularly, we know them well, so they become part of our family," Black said.

"We're smaller, it's familiar, and everybody gets treated with respect."

Orthopedic technologist David Carroll says treating conditions like diabetic wounds is specialized care.

"We cast people for ulcers, but also Charcot foot fractures which is quite serious as it can cause the bones in your foot to be displaced, so it's a very important program."

Carroll says regular casting for ankle and wrists also occur. Knee and hip injections to deal with painful joints are common.

Rosa Turkula is the unit clerk who has been with the team for 33 years. She's known as the "gatekeeper" by her staff, and is the first face patients see when they walk in the clinic.

"I set the tone and greet the patients, and just make them feel comfortable," Turkula said.

Her desk is adorned with thank you cards, photos and sweet messages from former patients and their families, many of them children.

"I love all this," she said. "It's the little things like this you appreciate because you know they really love you here in the clinic."

Turkula said younger patients appreciate the stuffed teddy bears she offers while they wait to receive care.

"This started many years ago when we were super busy doing casting care with younger patients at the time, some as young as three years old," she said.

She says the small but mighty Ambulatory Care team makes it easy for her to come to work every day.

"We all work together and help each other out, we care about our patients, it's just a great place to work."

DR. SETHI 'SURPRISED AND HONOURED' BY SERVICE RECOGNITION

A long-time physician at Misericordia Health Centre recently received a commemorative medal for his service to the community in northern Manitoba.

Dr. Krishan Sethi was presented the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal at a special ceremony held at the Manitoba Legislature in January.

He was nominated by Flin Flon MLA Tom Lindsay for his medical contributions to the rural community.

"I was quite surprised and honoured of course," Sethi said. "It was quite humbling."

Dr. Sethi, who has been a family physician for more than 40 years, was recognized for his long commitment serving the northern Manitoba community. He's also a big part of Misericordia's Clinical Resource Team handling emergency eye intake patients.

"As a physician, I always make time where Dr. Krishan Sethi was recognized with a Queen Elizabeth II I am needed," he said. "I really do enjoy Platinum Jubilee Medal for his years of service in northern in Flin Flon which I am going to honour Manitoba.

Sethi also received a Family Physician of the Year Award from The College of Family Physicians in 2005—the only physician in Northern Manitoba to have received this award.

He loves being a doctor and has no plans to fully retire just yet, though he's starting to scale back some of his work in the north and recently closed his family practice in Flin Flon.

"I closed the family practice at the end of last November, but there are still a number of charts to be transferred to the (Northern Regional Health Authority), and follow-up care for my patients as there was no physician available to take over my practice."

Going forward, Sethi says he plans to focus mainly on his work in Winnipeg.

"I'm in transition, let's say," he said. "But I still have other work commitments for the rest of the year."
